Each year, around 1,700,000 people are diagnosed with cancer. According to the American Childhood Cancer Organization, 300,000 of those people are children below the age of 19. According to the National Pediatric Cancer Foundation, cancer is the number one cause of death by disease among children. Although there are many childhood cancer research organizations, the media very rarely mentions any. For something so serious, the media should expose more information about it. This will than further donations and fundraising allowing for more research to be done.

Alex's Lemonade Stand Foundation (ALSF) is a not-for-profit organization that raises money for childhood cancer research. It was started by a four-year-old, Alex Scott, who wanted to help find a cure for the disease that tremendously impacted her life, eventually leading to her death.

ALSF has been extremely successful. In fact, it has fundraised around \$150 million dollars within 15 years since it was started. Many childhood cancer stories have been shared within the organizations community.

Cancer-affected families are the main people who will host the lemonade stands because they have been personally affected by the disease. However, it is time that more of us took a stand against childhood cancer. It is time that we all stand together and realize that these children are being deprived of their lives that haven't even began yet.

With help from everyone, we can make childhood cancer a more noticeable problem to the media. By coming together, we can help raise money that will be used to further help financially unstable families as well as fund research.
